


THANKSGIVING BASKETS




STUDENT TEACHER HIGHLIGHT:

5TH GRADE SCIENTISTS

Grade 5 students use a digital scale to mass (weigh) debris from a weathering experiment. The question for this lab experiment was "which rock type weathers the fastest...igneous, metamorphic or sedimentary?"



The fifth arade scientists used containers as mini rock tumblers to mimic the weathering process known as abrasion.

ALLOWABLE FOODS FOR SHARE TABLE:

- Unopened pre-packaged items, such as a bag of baby carrots or sliced apples, stored ina cooling bin
- Whole pieces of fruit with a peel, such as bananas or oranges
- Whole pieces of fruit with an edible peel, such as apples and pears, bust be rewshed unless wrapped.
- Unopened milk, if not immediately stored in a cooling bin maintained at 41°F or below.

UNALLOWABLE FOODS FOR SHARE TABLE:

- Foods not provided by the School Meal Programs (e.g., foods brought from home)
- Unpackaged items, such as a salad bowl without a lid
- Packaged items that can be opened and resealed
- Open items, such as an opened bag of baby carrots or sliced
- Perishable foods, when a temperature control mechanism is not in place.






